Krzysztof Szubert is graduated from the Warsaw University of Technology, Faculty of Industrial Organization and Management, specialization in industrial IT systems.

For more than twenty years he has held managerial posts in Polish and foreign enterprises in the ICT industry. Among others since 1998 he has held the post of President of the Management Board and Chief Operations Officer at Connect Distribution, which specializes within CEE region in value added distribution of specialist software - the company has won numerous prizes including the European Medal, Business Gazelle, Forbes Diamonds, award of the Minister of Economy and title of Ambassador of the Polish Economy 2016. He has been actively involved in the ICT industry and environment for a dozen or so years. Krzysztof Szubert is an author of many articles and commentaries in the daily press, specialist press and television. He was nominated for the title of "Personality of the IT" for his contribution to the IT industry.

Since 2012 he was the Minister of Digitization in the BCC Economy Shadow Cabinet. In that time he initiated and was a Chairman of the Coalition for the Development of the Information Society (KRESI) - a platform for dialogue and the cooperation of the most important environments and organizations related to the communications and IT industry in order to accelerate the development of the information society in Poland. In 2015 he was awarded "Polish ICT - Man of the Year" prize given annually by the Burda-Magazine / CRN.

In the years 2015-2016 Krzysztof Szubert was a member of the Digitization Council at the Ministry for Digital Affairs. From “Digital Divide” to “Information Inequality” Twenty years ago, we worried about the “digital divide” and hoped that it would be resolved by the simple expansion of Internet access the country and around the world. But while billions of people now have access to the Internet—in one way or another—not all access is equal. The FAIFE session this year explores three kinds of “information inequality” that remain or have become real issues for the world’s Internet users. CM Winters-Palacio, author and professor at Malcolm X College in Chicago, and Barbara M. Jones, author and former Director, Office for Intellectual Freedom, and Executive Director, Freedom to Read Foundation, American Library Association, consider economic barriers to effective access to and use of the Internet, using, as a case study, a surprising setting: the United States of America. Olga Kyrlyuk, Ukrainian lawyer and freedom of expression advocate, founder of the Digital Defenders Partners NGO, looks at political barriers to free and safe use of the Internet, such as filtering and surveillance, with special focus on situations in Eastern Europe. Frank Larue (invited), Guatemalan human rights expert and UNESCO Assistant Director-General for Communication and Information, explores cultural barriers to full participation of people in the global conversation, specifically the challenges presented to many by the vast preponderance of English and just a few other major languages on the Internet.
